Games Afternoon and Martha's 90th birthday celebration – with help from Cheryl's pen -

First, a game of spoons . Seated around one long table, spoons placed in the centre - one less than the number of players, everyone dealt 4 cards. The dealer takes a card and passes one on to the person on the left, the faster the discarded card is passed on the more frantic it becomes. The aim is to be the first to gather 4 of a kind and quietly take a spoon, which is a signal for everyone else to make a grab for one too. The person who misses out gets the letter S, and so on till someone's losses spell Spoon. Lyn Y. was somewhat at a disadvantage, joining the group after explanations were given and having to move seats to be more able to reach the spoons in the centre of the table. The move didn't help, and she was spooned out – at which time we split into two groups to play "Bananas"! -a game played with tiles with letters of



the alphabet. A bit like scrabble except each person uses their allocated tiles to make interlocking words.



Various codes are used to enable tiles to be swapped. The first person to use all their tiles wins. In hindsight it would have been more equitable if the two players whose first language was not English played in their mother tongue. And that was all we had time for before a "surprise" birthday afternoon tea in Martha's honour. Home movie – from Hazel's pen:

'Woman in Gold' This film based on the true story of Maria Altmann (Helen Mirren) who six decades earlier fled the Nazis in Vienna during WWII and settled in Los Angeles. She sets out to reclaim her family's artworks seized by the Nazis, amongst them a famous portrait of her beloved Aunt Adele by Gustave Klimt called 'Woman in Gold'. With the help of a young lawyer Randy Schoenberg (Ryan Reynolds) Maria embarks upon a lengthy legal battle to recover this painting and several others, but it is not easy because Austria considers them National treasures. She eventually wins her case, and the portrait is now on permanent display in the Neue Gallery in New York. The film has many flashbacks to Maria's life in Vienna as a young woman from a wealthy family. It has some harrowing scenes depicting the persecution of Jews. After the movie we moved outside to the verandah for lunch and those of us who experienced WW2 recounted their childhood memories of that time. As is often the case with Home Movies the discussion afterwards is sometimes just as enjoyable as the movie itself. Thanks once again Ray and Sally for being such lovely hosts.

40+ Fabulous -

a Fringe Festival event at the Kalamunda hotel. We had a leisurely drive through the forest, noting a multitude of fallen and/or mutilated trees, on the way. Parked just outside the back entrance, there was time for a quick drink and a snack of chips and garlic bread on the upstairs verandah before we took up front row seats in the large room, which we guessed held about 100 patrons – mainly young woman of a certain age, with a springling of older women and young men - who spent an enjoyable hour with raconteur/humourist Emma who regaled us with stories of her life – the good, the bad, joyous and sad in such a way that had her audience laughing uproariously. She delved briefly into the past – what was expected from a wife and mother in the 50s and 60s, greeted with guffaws of laughter from the young women but lived experience for some. On home territory, at the end of her performance Emma was emboldened to thank a couple of women who had supported her through a difficult period, tears and hugs all round. Happy, but reflective, we headed home via the more 'suburban' route, thinking we would be less likely to have a surprise encounter with a kangaroo.
